

Donald Trump secured the presidency. He won the majority of swing states, giving him a clear path to victory.








#### PRESIDENTIAL PERFORMANCE ACROSS RACIAL DIVIDES


#### PRESIDENTIAL PERFORMANCE AMONG LATINOS


#### PRESIDENTIAL PERFORMANCE AMONG WHITE VOTERS


#### PRESIDENTIAL PERFORMANCE ACROSS GENDER


#### PRESIDENTIAL PERFORMANCE ACROSS GENERATIONS





Senate Republicans retained the majority in the upper chamber, accounting for the Louisiana senatorial run-off election on December 10. Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV) is retiring at the end of this year and will be replaced by Chuck Schumer (D-NY). As a result, the chair of the Senate Democratic Policy and Communications Center will be available and must be filled.
